














### A Lifetime on the Waterfront

An early start is usually a good move, but it didn't work out quite so well for John Woolley.

John commenced work aged thirteen years, commercially fishing with his father at Hastings but due to Jock's tough approach to the training process, the partnership soon foundered. John then took

an apprenticeship with local boat

builder Jack Lierich.

When the business closed, John moved to Williamstown, and secured a start with JJ Savage and Sons. City life wasn't working out so well for young John, plus his wages barely covered the board and lodging at the Old Royal in Nelson Place. Savages pay was seven pounds five shillings per week, and the Old Royal charged John five pounds two shillings. Mind you this was around 1960.

The other problems at Savages were the stern and unrelenting pressure from the foreman, and the arduous job of retrieving the wayward goat when it often escaped. The goat also worked at Savages. Its job was keeping the weeds down around the slipway rail lines.

Then back to Stony Point fishing and crewing on various boats with the De Fina brothers Tony and Joe. One of De Fina's boats the Marconi was converted for private use and spent years on our marina before being sold and moved along. John had gained experience as a fisherman and boat builder, but his next job was in maritime construction, which lasted many years with contractors and harbour authorities around Western Port, French Island and Stony Point.



This work involved dredging, pile driving, crewing on dredges and launches, and wharf construction.

John liked the work and the variety and achieved some maritime qualifications.

Colin Duncan ran livestock on French Island and needed a practical method to access the "mainland". John worked on the Maribyrnong River converting a barge which became the French Island vehicle ferry. Later he drove the stock transport truck on and off



the Island.

After an injury caused by blasting for harbour work in Western Port, John left the Ports and Harbours and opened a fruit shop "just to be different". The shop provided fruit and vegetables to the locals but mainly to the maritime industry including overseas oil tankers.

Even with John's contacts, competition from the big operators was stiff. The competition he could cope with but being paid 90 days and longer after paying the growers and suppliers up front soon drove him out.

Then back to the boats. John's next job was driving "line" boats which helped dock the tankers, then as skipper on a workboat doing every task for Dillingham Constructions. When this finished, John worked on the HMAS Cerberus wharf reconstruction, but he had a feeling about going to sea.

The Seaman's Union offered only crewing on oil rig tenders or dredging, so after some delay John crewed on a dredge called Crocodile dredging in Western Port to create a swing basin for Lysaght Steel. Most construction contracts worked to a time scale, and when the dredging job finished John, ever the opportunist, boarded the oil rig tender Smit Lloyd 33 at short notice.

12month contract with Esso. Soon the going got a bit tough, and twice John landed a foreman stevedore position, but twice he lost it to seniority, so back to the Seaman's Union and back to sea.

John joined ships on the Australian coast, then on rig tenders in Bass Strait and the Northwest Shelf in Western Australia. The next

few years saw John in a variety of construction jobs, including work on a new wharf for the ill-fated Port Welshpool Sea Cat, for KV Johnson Marine contractors. Johnsons carried out

some renovation
work on our marina,
and a wake for the late

Kevin Johnson was recently held here in our clubhouse.

John recently contacted
RVMYC, chasing details
for the Marconi, as he was
following up on all the De
Fina boats. Jarmila from the
RVMYC office discovered he
was a mine of information and
suggested a visit to the Club.

We met John in the clubhouse, as well as a friend of his, Heather Arnold.


Heather and her late husband (also a John) owned the fine steel cruiser Woringerong, which was once here at the club.



This job lasted four years. John then graduated to coastal shipping, crewing on the Esso Gippsland, and then the Lysaght Endeavour.

Quote John: "After this job I resigned from the shipping industry and went back to fishing with a local Hastings fisherman. Very romantic and bringing back memories, but still smelly, cold, wet and poor pay". Then back to small business, with building maintenance and a
