

## Tell me something about you that might surprise

In 2008, I was giving a talk to a group of Vietnam Vets about the Battle of Coral, Balmoral in 1968 at Vietnam. For the first time since WW2, Australian tanks were being used to support infantry and intense fighting went on for a few weeks. I was in charge of ensuring the tanks were supported and supplied logistically. One of the tanks needed a spare part for its gun, so I commandeered a helicopter, flew to the front line,

identified the part, helicoptered back to base then returned with the part. The attack took place that night.

After the talk, this fellow came up to me and said if it wasn't for the tank support in the battle he definitely would not be here. This is something I rarely talk about but the three weeks we were involved is remembered in precise detail even down to each hour. Years later, I was confirmed as having PTSD, but was able to go on and work in logistics in several large companies


including Toyota, ICI and Ajax
Fasteners - which I enjoyed.
50 years, almost to the day,
after the Battle of Coral

unit was awarded a Citation for

On the palate there is an exciting persistence and depth of varietal fruit flavours enhanced by the crisp, dry finish. This is a style that can be enjoyed young and fresh however with cellaring it becomes an indelible treasure! This wine compliments all styles of cuisine.	12
Rosily	Chardonnay 2022 (Margaret River, WA)  Certified organic. Brilliant pale straw colour with highlights of green around the edges and a watery hue. Aromas of nectarine and dried honey intermix with biscuity oak, almond and gun flint notes. Nicely fleshed the mid weighted palate features white peach, nectarine and dried honey flavours over roasted almond and citrusy nougat characters. Finishes dry with a subtle cream-tinged mid length aftertaste. Drink over the next 3-4 years.	
Morin Pere & Fils	Pinot Gris 2021 (Languedoc, FRA) Bright pale straw colour with a watery hue. Pear and Jonathan apple aromas intermix with hints of honeysuckle and musk. Nicely rounded mouthfeel with pear and green apple fruits overlaying lime and wet stone characters. Finishes dry with a lick of brisk acidity enlivening the afterfaste. Drink now.	12
Buller Wines	The Nook Pinot Noir 2022 (King Valley, VIC) Dark red core with black shaded edges and dark red hue. Dark cherry and ripe strawberry aromas mix with vanillin cedar, subtle earth, and spice. Rich fleshy dark cherry and strawberry fruits decorate the medium bodied palate with notions of vanillin cedar, earth and spice lying underneath. Velvet smooth like tannin structure with a ripe juicy finish. Drink over the next 2-3 years.	6
ake Cooper Estate	Heathcote Shiraz 2020 (Heathcote, VIC) Matured for 12 months in French dak puncheons. Impenetrable inky black heart with a bright dark red, black tinged hue. Elevated red to dark plum, liquorice and ripe blueberry scents meld into some lightly toasted vanillin cedar and pepper notes. Medium to full in body spicy dark plum and liquorice fruits show good flesh with notions of vanillin cedar, clove and pepper lying underneath. Polished tannins with a bright well fruited mid length finish. Drink over the next 5-6 years.	6
dredge	Louie Cabernet Sauvignon 2020 (Care Valley, SA)	6



Louie Cabernet Sauvignon 2020 (Care Valley, SA)

First released in 1991, the 'Louie' Cabernet has been a consistent performer around the globe. The wine is dark brick red in colour with magenta hues. A bouquet of dark berry fruits with a hint of smokiness and spice is evident on the nose, whilst complex aromatics of wild sage, tobacco, cassis, blueberry, and seasoned oak. It is full and round in the mouth, with no hard sides through the flavour profile and it i good character. The wine will cellar well for 8-10
