Pelican's Consolation Cruise - April 2024 Story by John Marks

The original plan was a backto-back cruise to Port Lincoln, outward bound in February with the return leg in April. Most of our departures are scheduled to suit part owner Blake Jobson who can only cruise during school holidays.

This year there was not enough crew or interest in this epic voyage, so the consolation was a short trip to Flinders Island for a bit of fishing, diving and onshore exploration. Easter plus the tacked-on extra days of the first term holidays and the possibility of nice weather in April set the scene.

We are always a budget operation, so 900ltrs of diesel came aboard in nine runs of 5 x 20ltr drums syphoned in, a \$400 saving on the nearby fuel wharf. With around 300ltrs already aboard, that would be enough including a decent reserve. Ron Ellis, our navigator, anchor man, provedore and head chef brought the stores aboard on Good Friday and Easter Saturday. Then we disconnected the shore power and cast off around 1pm, which allowed a nice run with the ebb tide down the bay and through



the Heads. Missing was regular crew Peter Tantau who reluctantly backed out with a minor health scare.

Twenty-four hours later we anchored up in Winter Cove on Deal Island. The main job here was to re-discover a shallow gutter that the pro's must have missed, which was lined with dozens of huge black lip abalone. Not to be, maybe it was just an optical illusion? Previously we landed some nice gummies here, but that also failed to deliver. Next morning it was off to Roydon Island on Flinders' north-western corner. Previous efforts here produced plenty of 60cm flathead, whiting and snapper, plus good shelter from most wind directions. The whiting were absent, but we soon got into schools of mid-sized snapper.

Our Flinders Island contact Mike Nicholls lives at Emita, with his 34' steel workboat Bass Pyramid moored in the adjacent sheltered bay. We anchored here as Mike had generously agreed to collect Alan Jobson at the Whitemark airport and bring him down to Emita. We won't catch much here, opined John as the lines went out.

Next minute Blake steered a 74cm flathead into the landing net. These big frogs are usually breeding females, so it went back into the briny.

When Mike and Alan arrived at the boat ramp (which is only some improvement on sloping rocks), Ron had a BBQ in progress. Just great, perfect, sunny weather lounging and eating aboard Pelican. This weather just went on and on. Then Mike departed with Blake, who had agreed to fly to attend a family funeral at Mansfield.

Oh, and then just a few more big flatties and snapper. One 60cm+ frog went back unharmed but seemed to die as it lay on the bottom, three metres down next to the boat for another hour.





We were having problems setting the anchor, so John kitted up to check this and retrieve the fish. On inspection it was still breathing, then it just turned over and swam off, like it was taking a nap. The 40kg Rocna was not penetrating for the first time ever, maybe we needed to try harder?

In a day or two the weather changed with a strong westerly forecast. We moved to shelter in Peacock Bay behind Prime Seal Island, in company of a couple of yachts. We anchored well offshore to avoid the ribbon weed,

but this became uncomfortable, so we took a MAST Tassie Govt. mooring close to shore. Fishing was not as productive as on previous trips, but some nice gummies were landed, plus lots of bicatch: wrasse, Port Jackson sharks, chequer board sharks, toadies, skates, stingrays, spiky



gurnard etc., even a couple of big cuttlefish.

Blake flew in and hired a car at Whitemark airport, so back to Emita with a bit of porpoise spotting along the way!. In fact they travelled right next to our boat for short while.

The weather was still not performing, so we took to landbased touring in the hire car. Down to Lady Barron for a hot shower, supplies from the supermarket, then a cruise to Killiecrankie, Palana and Northwest River.



We also stopped off at a sensational men's shed at Whitemark; these guys make lots of interesting stuff on excellent machinery.

Killiecrankie in the Island's north has a sheltered bay, is base for the island's crayfishing fleet and is famous for Killiecrankie Diamonds which are topaz and are found by dredging and scavenging along the foreshore.

Palana is something of a timewarp, with the remains of a WW2 radar installation, plus it has a

semi-sheltered boat ramp behind a rocky outcrop. Northwest River at the island's northern tip has camping facilities adjacent to the huge shallow estuary.

On departure morning with another balmy day, the crew wanted a further shot at the

> snapper, so this was grudgingly granted before getting away around 9:30am. Thirty hours later we docked at Wyndham Harbour, happy with the weather, the company, the fishing and the ever-reliable boat.

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

Len Randell OAM


